School LAND Trust Expenditure Summary

2018-19 LAND Trust allocation was \$33,796. Monies were allocated according to the plan as submitted and approved. Funds were used to facilitate the continued use of academic computer software programs including: iStation, IXL Math, Reading Eggs, Math Seeds, Spelling City and Accelerated Reader. To further enhance language arts and literacy, money was used to purchase a set of Beehive Book awards and non-fiction periodical magazine subscriptions such as Time for Kids, National Geographic, Scholastic News, Weekly Reader and Utah Studies Weekly. Money was also portioned to keep our technology equipment computer lab and supplies current with headphones, keyboarding supplies, ink cartridges, SmartBoards and projectors. Funding also supported the purchase of 15 new ChromeBooks for individual student use. Investment in personnel was also allocated to support professional development for staff and to cover the wages and benefits of a 29.5 hr/wk paraprofessional for additional classroom support. Based on the Plan's identified five goals, student performance and achievement in language arts, mathematics, science and technology made adequate to significant progress.

<u>2017-18 LAND Trust allocation was \$32,200</u>. The land trust money distributed to Ferron Elementary School for the 2017-2018 school was spent according to the plan as submitted in the spring of 2017. Items purchased with these funds include,

- Two sets of the beehive book award nominees, were purchased.
- Subscriptions to nonfiction student periodicals were purchased, such as Time for Kids, National Geographic for kids.
- The renewal of technology software programs were also renewed. These include Reading Eggs, Spelling City, iStation, Reading A-Z and Ed Helper.
- The purchase and replacement of two Smartboards, projectors, and document cameras. Some microphones were replaced in a few classroom amplification systems.
- A class size reduction aide was employed for 29.5 hours a week.
- Some funds were spent on professional development for the teachers and principal.
- 15 Chrome books were purchased for class use.
